13. The rules set out in the Schedule to this Determination shall apply to and in respect of any election of a Primate.

14. In this Determination and in the Schedule hereto unless the context otherwise indicates:—

"Metropolitan" means a Metropolitan Bishop eligible for election as Primate.

"Senior Bishop" means the Bishop not being a Metropolitan who is Senior by Consecration and includes the Bishop next in seniority where the Senior Bishop is unable to act.

SCHEDULE

1. The Senior Bishop, together with the Bishop next in seniority to him present at the conclave, shall examine the ballot papers, and after the Senior Bishop has rejected the informal ballot papers, if any, shall count the total number of first preferences recorded on the valid ballot papers for each Metropolitan.

If as the result of this count any Metropolitan has received an absolute majority of first preference votes, he shall be the choice of the Bishops. If no Metropolitan has received an absolute majority of first preference votes, a second count shall be made, but before this is done, the Metropolitans shall be arranged on a list (in these rules referred to as "the order of preferences") in the order of the number of first preferences recorded for each Metroplitan, beginning with the one for whom the greatest number of first preferences is recorded.

If the number of first preferences recorded for any two or more Metropolitans is equal, they shall, as between themselves, be arranged on the order of preferences in the order of the second preferences recorded for each of them, beginning with the Metropolitan for whim the greatest number of second preferences is recorded, but if the first and second preferences for each of them is equal they shall, as between themselves, be arranged in like manner in the order of the third preferences recorded for each of them, and a like process, if necessary, shall be followed until all the Metropolitans are duly arranged on the order of preferences, provided that if the number of first, second, third and all other preferences recorded for any two or more of the Metropolitans for whom the number of first preferences recorded is equal, the Senior Bishop shall determine by lot the order in which such Metropolitans are to be arranged in the Order of preferences.

 On the second count the Metropolitan who has received the fewest number of first preference votes shall be excluded, and each ballot paper counted to him shall be

cov $\ 1$ to the Metropolitan next in order of the voter's prefere. .

If a Metropolitan then has an absolute majority of votes, he shall be the choice of the Bishops; but if no Metropolitan has an absolute majority of votes, the process of excluding the Metropolitan who has the fewest votes, and counting his ballot papers to the continuing Metropolitan next in order of the voter's preference shall be repeated until one Metropolitan has received an absolute majority of votes.

The Metropolitan who has received an absolute majority of votes shall be the choice of the Bishops.

3. Where as the result of the counting two Metropoiltans only remain unexcluded, and each is credited with an equal number of votes, one of them shall be excluded in accordance with rule four of this Schedule, and the other shall be the choice of the Bishops.

4. Where a Metropolitan has to be excluded at any count and two or more Metropolitans have an equal number of votes, such number being the fewest, regard shall be had to the total number of original votes credited to each of those Metropolitans, and the Metropolitan with the fewest such total number shall be excluded.

Where such total numbers of original votes are equal, regard shall be had to the total number of votes credited to each of those Metropolitans at the earliest count at which they had an unequal number of votes, and the Metropolitan with the fewest such total number at that count shall be excluded.

Where those Metropolitans had an equal number of votes at all counts, the one of them who is lowest on the order of preferences shall be excluded.

5. In this Schedule:—

"An absolute majority of votes" means a greater number than one-half of the whole number of ballot papers counted.

"Continuing Metropolitan" means a Metropolitan not already excluded at the count.

"Original vote" in regard to any Metropolitan means a vote derived from a ballot paper on which a first preference is recorded for that Metropolitan.

"Determine by lot" means determine in accordance with the following directions, that is to say, the names of the Metropolitans concerned having been written on similar slips of paper, and the slips having been folded so as to prevent identification and mixed and drawn at random, the Metropolitans concerned shall, as amongst themselves, be arraged in the order of preferences in the order in which the slips containing names are drawn beginning with the Metropolitan whose name is on the slip drawn first.
