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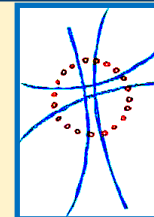

A word from Bishop Murray

My wife Leanne is a Primary School Teacher and so we have plenty of packets of seeds lying around the house in various places, awaiting wholesale planting in punnets so the children can learn about seeds and growth. Some of the packets of seeds sit around for a few years before being used so I often worry that they won't grow, but it never seems to make any difference. The potential for new life contained in a seed is amazing.



In a tomb in Argentina in the 1960's Archaeologists found a children's rattle that they dated to be about 600 years old. It was made of Walnut Shell with Cana Lily seeds inside. They took some of the seeds out and planted them. They grew and even produced flowers!

Jesus knew of the tremendous potential within the seed to bring about new life, growth and change. So he taught using seed parables. We each sow the seed of the Word each day as we share our faith with others. A key Christian belief is that the seed of the Word (semina verbi) sown by the Spirit is part of God's ongoing creation and prepares the whole creation and humanity for full maturity in Christ. Yet it's easy to be discouraged when we think that our sharing (or sowing) appears to have had no effect.

But who knows when, with the Spirit's help and encouragement, this seed will spring to life?
