

Looking Forward, Looking Back



As a young adult I used to help lead High Ropes adventures for teenagers. This involved the participants being secured in a harness and then climbing up in the trees and being suspended on high tension cables and ropes strung between the trees and platforms as they safely made their way around a set adventure course. This was a great way for young people to have fun while growing in self confidence and facing their fears. Sometimes however participants would be so frozen by fear that they couldn't move forward or back on the course and would have to be rescued.

This story came to mind as I thought of the Cursillo theme for the 40th Anniversary: **looking forward and looking back**. Sometimes we're uncomfortable about looking back. There are things from the past we'd rather forget. Lot's wife was turned into a pillar of salt for disobeying the angel's command by looking back. But looking forward can be scary as well, especially when we look around at all the challenges of our world.

Yet the scriptures are constantly looking both forward and back in order to help us understand God's work in the world. In 1 Samuel, David draws strength for his encounter with the much stronger Philistine Warrior by recalling how courageous he was in the past.

Psalm 105 also looks both forward and back. In Verse 4 the psalmist seeks God's face *continually* – The Hebrew *tamid* can also be translated "forevermore". Hence the KJV ... *seek his face forevermore*. But in the very next verse, the psalmist calls us to "remember the marvels God has done". A constant looking forward, yet looking back.

May Psalm 105 be our guide then: Let's seek God's face now and in the future, and remember the marvels he has done in the past. As Archbishop Francois Fenelon once wrote, we should let gratitude for the past inspire us with trust for the present.

It's good to glance back occasionally and see how far we've come in our Christian walk. That's what we did when Cursillistas gathered together in Grafton for our 40th anniversary celebrations. Whether our Cursillos were a l-o-n-g time ago or more recently, we recalled the people we had made friends with diocesan wide, the talks, the theme and the one or two songs we may have sung.

Reminisce, look back at how simply attending a Cursillo weekend has changed our lives. For so many, Cursillo was a life-changing experience but I do acknowledge that for some it was a struggle. How can we provide opportunities for the Holy Spirit to regenerate people, to fire us up to go back into our parishes with renewed energy- and not just

those who have already attended Cursillo but anyone who attends a Regener8, a Fire Day or a Diocesan Ultreya? That's right, they're open to the wider Christian community! So let's invite others in our parish to a Cursillo activity.

THE EARLY DAYS OF CURSILLO IN GRAFTON DIOCESE

Terry: I made my Cursillo at Men's 2 in 1983 in Grafton Diocese under the auspices of the then Bishop, Donald Shearman. Cursillistas from the Dicoese of Canberra/Goulburn came up to lend their guidance, energy and enthusiasm. Mrs Frankie Gatenby and I were the first Lay-Co-ordinators for the Diocese, serving from Sept'83 until the end of '85. During those 2 years an incredible 15 Cursillos were held. By that time over 500 men and women had made their Cursillo in our Diocese.

As well as managing these fifteen Cursillos, teams from Grafton
Diocese led the first Cursillos in Brisbane, with 4 being held in 1985 in
spite of the lack of episcopal support.

Two years later, in 1987, the Diocese again took Cursillo to neighbouring Armidale Diocese with great support from the bishop there. I had the privilege of being Lay Director of Men's 1, both in Armidale and Brisbane.

It was Bishop Donald Shearman of Grafton Diocese who gave the fledging Cursillo movement support and energy in the early months.

Gae: I attended Women's 1 in 1983. It was Cursillo that equipped me for my journey as a Christian for the rest of my life. I had the privilege of being on team several times, including being on Women's 1 when a team from this Diocese went to Brisbane and Newcastle to inaugurate the Cursillo movement. Cursillo helped me gain an insight into how a person can grow in Christ when you step out in faith. Adapting to "strange" places brought me a new self-confidence and openness to future tasks God had for me. **Continued on page 9.**
